Rebuilding Hope Partnering With the Triangle Literacy Council

Rebuilding Hope is partnering with the Triangle Literacy Council (TLC) in a first-of-itskind pilot program to help young men and women in Vance County earn a GED.

The program, Constructing Pathways to Prosperity (P2P), is part of the GED curriculum. Students earn the equivalency diploma while getting hands-on job skills training in the construction industry, according to program manager Jason Williams.

In its role, RHI will provide students with opportunities to build wheelchair ramps and complete other projects, provide tools and materials and supervise the completion of jobs.

"This is a six-month, full-time program with 15 participants at a time," Mr. Williams says. "It runs four days a week with two days dedicated to the education component and two days spent on the construction site."

P2P is designed for "ages 16-24 to help rebuild their communities and their lives," according to program information. "This program will work specifically with youth who have come to the attention of the justice system, are low-income, or have not attained a high school diploma or equivalency and are not currently attending public school."

The P2P instructor for the component, which meets Wednesdays and Fridays, is a licensed contractor.

Upon completion of the program, students earn a construction certificate, Mr. Williams says, and receive assistance in finding a job.

Students meet Tuesdays and Thursdays for the education component. Classes are conducted at the Gang Free building on County Home Road.

Students in the GED program are paid \$50 a week and an additional \$10 an hour when they're on a P2P job, he says.

Mr. Williams says that funding comes from a \$300,000 U.S. Department of Commerce grant won by the Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Governments and runs through June 2019.

RHI Volunteer Spotlight

Depending on the type of work requested, RHI may require evidence of ownership of property. A landlord's permission for a wheelchair ramp is required.

While RHI provides services at no cost, donations from applicants are appreciated.

RHI accepts some used appliances that are in good working order. The appliances include washers and dryers, refrigerators and electric stoves. Appliances that require repairs cannot be accepted.

RHI does not have used furniture and cannot accept household goods or clothing.



Building Wheelchair Ramps: Answers to Your Questions

Churches, do you have groups – like the one pictured above -- who can lend a hand and help us build wheelchair ramps? Your participation would help reduce a backlog of more than 30 requests – and help us all reach our communities for Christ.

Here are answers to some questions you might have.

What preparations are made before

work begins? Before work begins, an RHI volunteer will visit the job site and assess the owner's physical and spiritual needs. The volunteer will take measurements and draw a plan. Job sites are different and custom plans are necessary.

What about materials and tools? RHI will gather the materials and deliver them to the job site and provide tools, as needed.

Are building permits required? RHI will obtain the required permits.

Who will supervise and be responsible for the work? An experienced RHI crew leader.

How long does building a ramp take? Depending on the ramp (e.g., straight ramp or ramp with a landing) and the number of crew members, it's a day to a day-and-a-half job.

Where are job sites located? In all the communities we serve, but every effort will be made to assign work in the vicinity of your church.

Can work be scheduled on Saturdays? Yes.
